

FORMER PLAYERS CLUB UPDATE - SOME WONDERFUL REUNIONS




Since our last Newsletter we've had two Former Player Club meetings – in May, and then in July when we ordered some sunshine and moved outside for a BBQ at a local cricket club.

Between the sticks

Two more additions here to bring those guarding the line up to 52. First in since the last Newsletter is England U20 international **Ted Smith** who is now a recruitment specialist. We also now welcome (at last!) **Mark Oxley** – our 2017/18 Player of the Year is now at Harrogate Town.

At the back

Four new members here to bolster the back line up to an impressive 142. First up, shortly after his loan spell ended, is **Deon Woodman**. He played his part in helping to bolster our squad at the need of a turbulent 2023/24 campaign, and what we especially loved about Deon is the enthusiasm he showed in his brief spell as a Shrimper.

Next up is **Craig Davidson**. The former Canvey Island, Chelmsford City, Daggers and Aldershot full back was with us as young player 1991-95 making one appearance (he did have the great Chris Powell to try and oust for a place!). He now works at USP College and is the Assistant Manager for Hashtag Ladies.

Michael Gonzague, now working in healthcare, was in our squad in the early 1990's Championship years and got in touch with us after our landmark 500th member Keith Jones put him on to us. He played many reserve games at Roots Hall but never quite got in to the first team, and left to join Hereford United, then played in China and Hong Kong for a couple of years, before playing non-league football for a number of local teams including Wivenhoe.

Our final new defensive member is **Jean Yves M'voto**. The former French U19 international defender joined us on loan from Sunderland during the 2009-10 season (17 appearances, one goal) and went on to play for Oldham, Orient and Barnsley. He currently plays for German club VfR Wormatia and is also a scout for GM Sport Management.

Middle of the park

Four new men arrive here to give us a bit of depth in the middle now with 166 members. First of the new additions is **Etan Hamilton**, now plying his trade with Lincoln City. He had a fantastic season in 2023/24 until it ended with injury and is now working his way back to full fitness.

We then made contact with **Mark Patterson**, now a landscape gardener. With us in 1996/97 and 1998/99 over two loan spells, Mark achieved much in a 500-plus game career. 
Our landmark 500th member proved to be **Keith Jones**. With us 1991 to 1994 making over 100 appearances, the former Chelsea, Brentford, Charlton and Reading man has for many years now been a coach in the US for SC del Sol. We hope to see him soon on his next trip back to the UK.

We also can now welcome to our midfield squad **Russell Williamson**, who was a Shrimper in the 2000/01 season scoring twice (both v Torquay in the FA Cup) in 14 appearances. A big thank you to our friends at the Wimbledon Old Players Association for putting us in touch with Russell. 'WOPA' are a growing force in the former players group world, and probably are now the third largest group in the UK behind Plymouth Argyle and, ahem, Southend United.

Up front

Three new faces in our forward line to bring our strike force up to 127, two of whom we cover separately in the next section. The third is **David Lazell**, who played in our reserve team and who we were delighted to catch up with at one of our Former Players Club meetings. David continues to be involved in vets' football where he often comes across fellow Shrimper Garry Nelson.

THE OLDEST SHRIMPER ALIVE



Now, here's a tale. We thought this one repeating.

Back in May, after some painstaking research, we received a call from a former player's daughter to say that her dad had received our somewhat speculative letter, was in good health, and would love to be part of SUEPA. So, a call was set up with 93-year-old **Jimmy Thomson**, but it had taken a long while to get to that point.

Look up 'Jimmy Thomson' in any search engine and you'll get quite a long list – Scotland is full of them. Go to any pub in Glasgow and say 'Oi Jim, would you like a drink?' and loads of faces will turn round - it will cost you a fortune. Having a date and place of birth helps (our Jimmy was born in Govan on 17 March 1931), but it is still tricky, especially when the average nonagenarian is not usually posing on Instagram.

A couple of our SUEPA Agents are quite adept at using ancestry tracing sites, piecing together a likely location/family story, and over the last year or so we thought we'd found our Jimmy a couple of times only to receive a call back saying they were not him. Once we just had a phone number and called it – that was fun, Jimmy Thomson answered but this one hated football (and probably anyone south of Hadrian's Wall).

That there was no apparent death record though gave us hope, and a speculative punt at an address in Scotland for another Jimmy Thomson (whose ancestry history checked out) led to a letter winging its way north of the border. After four weeks had passed it had seemed that our investment in a first-class stamp had not paid off, but then we got the call from Jimmy's daughter Deborah, and we were truly delighted.

Deborah told us that her dad (who prefers to be called James or Jim) lives in his own house (with one of her brothers) and still does all of his own chores – he was one of 13 children of whom six remain alive with Jim being the second oldest left (and he has an 88-year-old brother who lives in Essex who we've since had a great chat with). Strong genes in the Thomson clan.

It was Harry Warren that signed Jim for Southend back in May 1956. He made his Shrimper debut on 30 August 1956 in a 2-1 defeat at Newport County and made 34 appearances that season scoring 10 goals. He scored twice in the FA Cup Second Round tie v Hereford United, and then famously got the winner at home to then Second Division Liverpool in the Third Round in front of 18,253 at Roots Hall. We would go on to lose to Birmingham City in Round Four, he played in that too, and the Roots Hall crowd that day was 28,964.

Jim's last game that season was away to Ipswich, and we can only assume he must have got a bad injury as he didn't play at all in the first team the following season. He returned to the side in September 1958, playing alongside fellow SUEPA members Bill Punton (who turned 90 in May), Alan Dicks (who on 29 August reached his 90th milestone) and young Terry Kent (who is only 84), and made a further ten appearances scoring three goals.

After 44 appearances and a healthy 13 goals, Jim left in March 1959 for Southern League Headington United (now Oxford United).

In our chat with Jim he told us how the whole Southend squad went to Wembley in 1957 to see their teammate Sammy McCrory earn his only cap (and score) for Northern Ireland. For a treat, here's the YouTube link to that match video - wonderful stuff, and oh that commentary!

Anyway, lots of memories from yesteryear in speaking to Jim, and we then thought that was that, we'd traced our oldest living Shrimper. We were wrong.

Believing Jimmy to be the oldest living SUFC player we declared that on social media. That led to a football historian, researching the UK's oldest living footballers, getting in touch to enquire whether we had checked out a couple of other names. So we did and found 94 years-young **Eric Marsden**!

Via some ancestry website investigations, we connected with a family tree and made contact with someone there who informed us that Eric was currently in hospital near Coventry. This tied in with some internet research where on a Crystal Palace website someone had posted that they had seen him three years ago in Tesco near Coventry.

So, address details obtained, we duly wrote to Eric's home address and are immensely thankful to a kind neighbour of Eric's who helps him and his wife Terri as he called us and explained that Eric had recently had a hip operation and was convalescing in a home, with the hope that, if he gets fit enough, he will be able to move back to be with Terri again - they have been married for over 70 years.

Eric's home debut for us was against Norwich City on 25 October 1952. So, he is not only our oldest player alive but also the only player alive who played for us at the old Southend Stadium at Grainger Road before we moved into Roots Hall in 1955. Further, from research undertaken by the above-mentioned football historian, we understand that Eric is in the top 20 of current living UK footballers.

We obtained a copy of Eric's home debut programme and sent it to him before having a quick chat. Eric was born in Bolsover in 1930, and after WWII did his National Service in the army. He started playing football for Winchester City, and it was from there that he was spotted by a Crystal Palace scout and made the big move in to Third Division league football. Eric, a centre forward, made 34 appearances scoring 11 times for the Selhurst Park men, before Harry Warren brought him to Southend in October 1952. He had a great start, scoring a brace at Layer Road in a 3-3 draw v Colchester United on 18 October 1952, and made his home debut a week later v Norwich in front of 15,500 at our old ground. He ended up scoring six in 15 appearances by mid-January, but then played no more for us (Eric couldn't recall why!) and signed for Shrewsbury Town in March 1953 for whom

he made 11 appearances. We've since been in touch with The Shrews who have themselves now got in touch with Eric – he is their oldest player too!

After Shrewsbury, Eric played non-league football, and was top scorer for Bath City in the 1954/55 season with 21 goals. He earned his living for many years as a Production Manager for Lockheed, who in effect gave birth to the local works team today known as Leamington FC but were previously known as AP Leamington. Eric and Terri were keen golfers in their earlier retirement years, and Eric still maintains an interest in football, following his local team Coventry City.

Finding Eric led us to undertake a thorough review of all past players. We started checking the list of the UK's oldest people (which lists all persons alive from 107 and up) and, satisfying ourselves that there was no Shrimper on that, we then checked the position for every former player who, if they were alive today, would be aged 106 or less. We are now 100% certain that Eric is the 'top man'!

SUEPA has had many memorable moments since being founded six years ago, and speaking to both Jimmy and Eric is right up there as a true highlight. They are both part of our club's proud history, and in many respects as our oldest players are the father of it.

RIP CHICO, DAVE AND ALAN

It is with great sadness that we've lost three great Shrimper characters since our last Newsletter.

Chico Hamilton, who we signed from Chelsea in 1968, passed away in May after a battle with dementia. He made a huge impact for us in our 'black top' 1968/69 season, scoring 12 from 40 appearances, and was sold for £40,000 (eight times the amount we paid for him) to Aston Villa in July 1969. We never managed to catch up with Chico to sign him up for SUEPA – we even at one point had a Shrimper fan exile in Spain visit a bowls club Chico was known to frequent without any joy – but he will always be remembered with great fondness by those who saw him play.

David Martin-Chambers passed away back in June. A Barnsley lad, his playing career took him to Wolves, Denaby United, Rotherham, and Cambridge United before landing at Roots Hall in October 1968. He scored five times in 66 appearances for us, playing alongside Chico in that 1968/69 season, and married local lass Penny in June 1971 by which time he'd ultimately moved on to York. Penny and Dave ended up emigrating to New Zealand.

Our former player and manager **Alan Little**, who we met up with at Halifax three years ago and then more recently at York, passed away at the beginning of August after a long illness. He was a lovely man, and regaled us with some top stories during our meet ups. The applause tribute paid by the whole of Roots Hall for our opening match v York was emotional.
